## ...With Refugees...

"Can you help!?" Venezuelan Sisters Maigualida Riera and Marielena Ridad knew Associate Besty Hague would be the right person to ask. In the past couple of years, Betsy has been devoted to teaching English to some of the young Sisters in Venezuela—to the extent of taking challenging classes and earning a certificate as a teacher of English to non-native English speakers.

When two young men, Brayan and Andres, made their way from Venezuela to the U.S. border and crossed in Texas, the older son, Brayan, was put on a bus to New York City. However, because Andres is only 17, he was retained in one of the enormous holding facilities for minors in Texas. He would not be released until someone agreed to become his guardian. The two Sisters, Maigualida and Marielena, are close friends with the boys' family and pleaded with Betsy on their behalf.

Betsy said yes, of course I will help!

The process of transferring Andres to Betsy's care took many months and five different case workers. Betsy also provides a home for Brayan, who moved from New York. When Brayan joined Andres at her home, Betsy described a grand celebration for the young men to be back together again.

Learning to teach English to the Spanish-speaking Sisters has improved Betsy's Spanish language skills, but communicating with the boys was still extremely difficult. Betsy invited Sister Pat Gootee, who had worked for ten years in Venezuela and 40 years in Peru, to join their household for several weeks to assist in their conversations. Sister Pat, aged 91, was delighted with her "new mission," and the three quickly and easily fell into a loving, affectionate friendship.

Betsy enrolled Andres in the same school her children and grandchildren attended; he tested well enough to enter the 9th grade, even though he had only a 6th-grade education. Despite the challenging language barrier, Andres has been doing very well. He is attending summer sessions of English through the public school. He is eager to become fluent in English, and he and Betsy hope his English will progress enough to take a full load of classes as a tenth grader this fall.

Andres is an avid boxer, and it didn't take long for him to locate a club near their home. He won most of his boxing matches in Venezuela. Betsy had been searching for weeks for help in representing Andres in court. Andres found a lawyer from the boxing club to represent him; the lawyer waived his legal fees, and Betsy would only need to cover the court fees.

Betsy describes Brayan as a strong, hard worker who loves to help. She is currently looking for an unpaid apprenticeship position where he can learn a trade. As the many pieces of providing a home for the two have fallen into place, Betsy says, "Isn't it amazing how the Spirit brings everything together?"
